Wouldn't it be sad if God had to say of your child, "He did ... evil in the sight of the Lord, and walked in the way of his father and in the way of his mother" (1 Kings 22:52).

The choice is yours: Where is your path leading you? Where are you leading your children? Turn to Christ now for your eternal good and that of your family as well!
